EDWARD REHBERG CONVICTED

**Found Guilty of Manslaughter and
Sentenced to Five Years at
Hard Labor.**

The "Rehberg case" has become a cele-
brity in the legal annals of Montana. A
brief resume of its circumstances is timely,
in view of the decision just reached at
Boulder.

In November, 1885, indictments were
found in the district court of Lewis and
Clarke county against Louisa Rehberg and
Edward Rehberg for cruelly beating and
bruising Clara Rehberg, daughter of Ed-
ward Rehberg and stepdaughter of Louisa
Rehberg, on the 8th or 9th of August of
that year, from which brutal treatment the
child died on the night of September 5th,
1885. The case was tried at the March
term of court here, Casey & Voss appear-
ing for the defense. Louisa Rehberg was
acquitted and the jury disagreed in regard
to Edward. A change of venue to Jeffer-
son county was granted in the case of Ed-
ward Rehberg, and the action came up at
Boulder last May, with Carter & Clayberg
as defending counsel. Throughout the case
was prosecuted by District Attorney Hunt,
assisted by his deputy, E. D. Weed. In the
trial of last May the jury disagreed, after
wrestling with the case for forty continu-
ous hours. A new trial was ordered and
had at the term of court just concluded at
Boulder, in which the jury found Edward
Rehberg guilty of manslaughter. His at-
torneys moved for a new trial, but Judge
Wade denied the motion and sentenced
Rehberg to five years in the penitentiary
at hard labor. It is understood that Reh-
berg's counsel will appeal the case to the
supreme court.
