## REHBERG REPRIEVED.

### The Supreme Court Reverses Judge Wade's Decision and Orders a New Trial.

Looking over the Supreme Court journal to-day the following entry met the eyes of a reporter: "Territory vs. Edward Rehberg; judgment reversed and case remanded for new trial. Opinion by Galbraith, Justice. Ordered that defendant be turned over to the custody of the sheriff of Jefferson county."

The opinion was delivered at this morning's session and the prisoner, who is now in the penitentiary, will be taken to the Boulder jail to await another trial. Once there he will be immediately released on bail, his former bond holding good.

It will be remembered that Rehberg and his wife were jointly indicted for inflicting bodily injuries upon their young daughter that caused her death. Seperate trials were obtained and Louisa, the stepmother of the injured child, was acquitted. On a change of venue Edward was tried at the Boulder court and the jury found him guilty of manslaughter, after which he went to the penitentiary. Carter & Clayberg, his counsel, appealed to the Supreme Court, alleging errors in the district trial as grounds of appeal. The case was argued last week by Mr. Carter, and to-day the decision was handed down, reversing the judgment of the lower court. The opinion sustained the allegations of the appellant that the court erred in excluding certain evidence on cross-examination and in overruling the motion for a new trial. The opinion likewise upheld the affirmation of the appellant that the evidence, which was entirely circumstantial, was not sufficiently conclusive to produce a moral certainty that the defendant was the guilty party—a requirement of the law in all criminal cases.
